



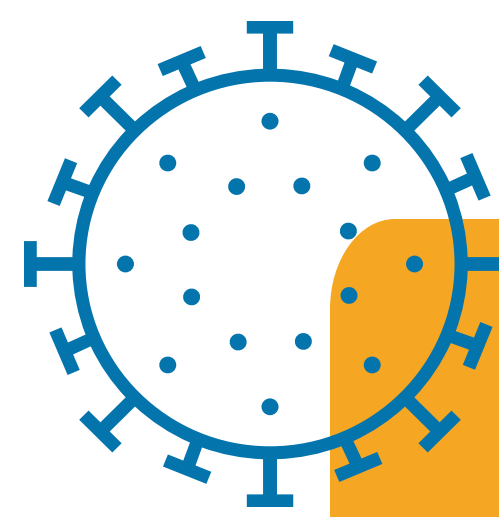
COVID-19 SHOT

GETTING THE COVID SHOT IS ONE OF THE TOOLS WE HAVE TO FIGHT THE PANDEMIC.

To stop this pandemic, we need to use all of our prevention tools.

The COVID shot is one of the best tools to protect your health.

The shot works with your body's natural defenses. Studies show that the COVID-19 shot helps you from getting the virus and keeps you from getting seriously ill, if you do get the virus. The shot does not carry a live virus and cannot give you COVID-19.

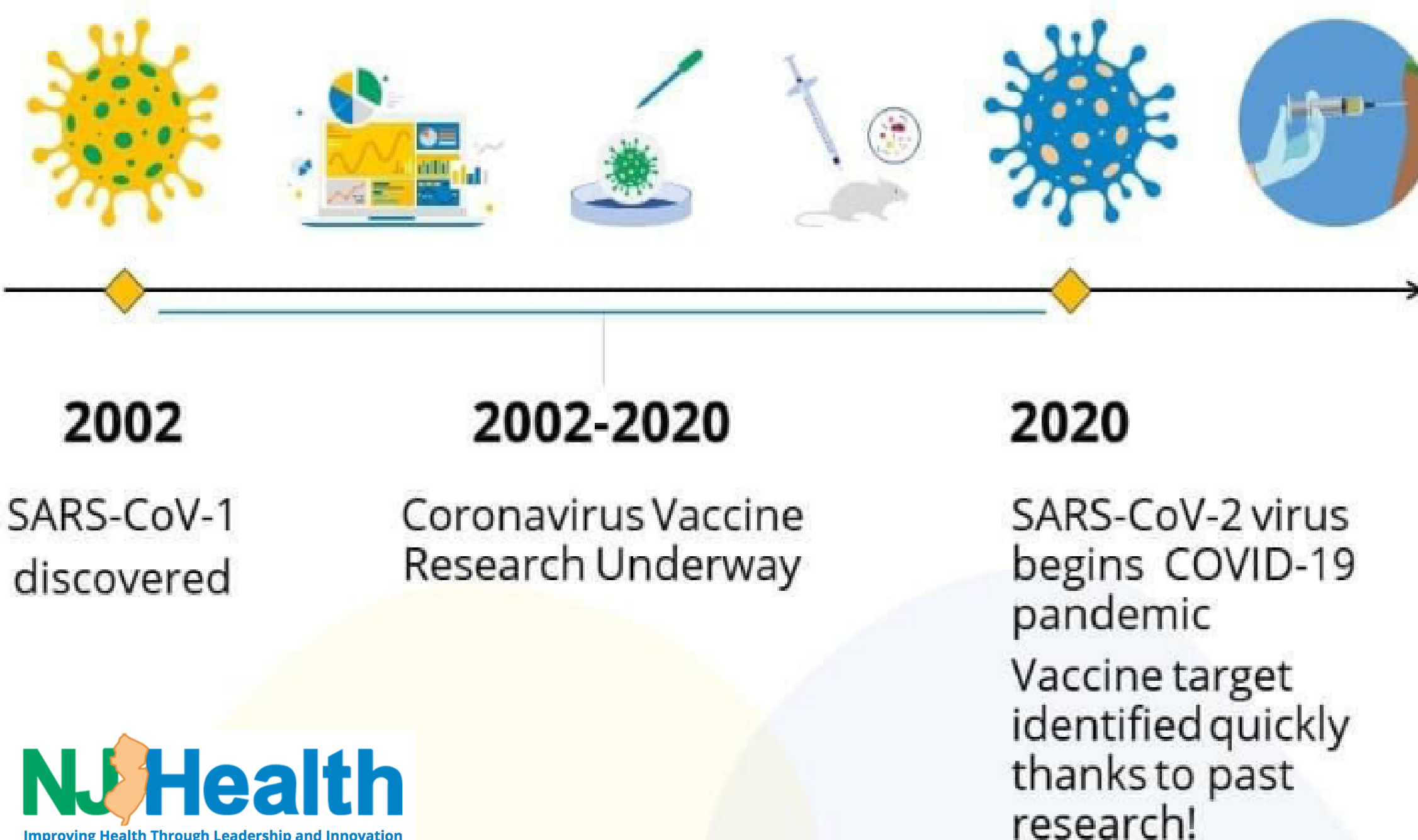


The shot is safe. The research to create the COVID shot started in 2002 when the Coronavirus was first discovered. The companies that created the COVID shot used the same safety tests and standards used for other vaccines such as the pneumonia, flu, polio, and tetanus shots. With over 4.9 billion shots given worldwide so far, the data shows that the COVID-19 shot is effective and safe.

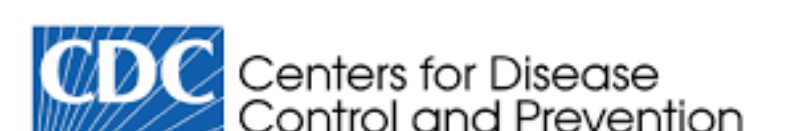


Different types of COVID-19 shots are available. The Pfizer and Moderna shots require two doses. The first shot gets your body ready. The second shot is given at least three weeks later to make sure you have full protection. The Johnson & Johnson shot only requires one dose. If you are told you need two shots, make sure that you get both of them. The shots may work in slightly different ways, but will help protect you. The Pfizer shot has been approved by the FDA. The Moderna and Johnson & Johnson shots are pending FDA approval.

The shot may cause side effects in some people, like sore muscles, feeling tired, or mild fever. These reactions mean the shot is working to help teach your body how to fight the virus. Most people only have the side effects for a day or two. The side effects do NOT mean that you have the virus. Just like with taking any medication there are some rare reactions. It is unlikely that you will have problems, but if you do, you can call 911 or go to the emergency room.

Washing your hands often and staying at least 6 feet away from other people you do not live with are two other ways to protect yourself and the people around you. The shot is available to all people with the exception of children under the age of 12. If you have received your shot, you will be able to get a booster shot to give you added protection against COVID-19 variants.



You should continue to wear a mask to protect yourself and the people around you. Your doctor will most likely require you to wear a mask when getting any medical treatment. Be sure to cover your nose and mouth with your mask.

WHERE TO GET YOUR COVID-19 SHOT

You can call your local county health department to find out where you can get your COVID shot. The shots are given at CVS, Kroger, Walgreens, and Walmart locations across Kentucky. If you are not sure where to get the shot or need help getting to the shot location, you can call us at 1-866-516-3051.

IMPORTANT MEDICARE COVERAGE INFORMATION FOR COVID-19

Medicare Part B covers the cost of the COVID-19 shot and COVID-19 test. If you have Medicare Part B, you will not be charged for these services.

Medicare also covers the cost of the COVID-19 monoclonal antibody treatments if you test positive for COVID-19, have a mild to moderate case, and are at high risk of progressing to a severe case. This treatment is covered 100% by Medicare during the Public Health Emergency when you get the treatment from a Medicare provider or supplier.
